Think Lyme Disease!

Children ages 5-14 are at the highest risk. Tiny ticks can transmit more than one disease. Symptoms vary and misdiagnosis is common—a rash is not always present. Early treatment is important to prevent later stages including neurologic, arthritic, and heart related complications. If you find an attached tick, never squeeze or twist it—put tweezers close to the skin, pull the tick straight out, clean the site and see a doctor. Do not depend on Lyme tests, they are not always accurate.
