





WHEREAS:

Lyme Disease is the fastest growing vector-borne disease in the United States with 476,000 new cases reported to the CDC each year, with no

surveillance for chronic cases. The average patient goes two or more years before getting a proper diagnosis; and

WHEREAS:

It is caused by the bacterium Borrelia burgdorferi, and is found in 45% of ixode scapulari or black-legged deer ticks in Texas. The risk of contracting Lyme disease can be year-round, and tick bites are nearly painless and can be from a tick the size of a poppy seed; and

WHEREAS:

Lyme Disease is a complex, multi-system illness which if caught early can be treated effectively, but if left untreated, can invade the nervous system, heart and multiple organs of the body causing years of pain, suffering, severe disability, and even death; it can manifest as flu like symptoms, arthritis, migraines, fibromyalgia, chronic fatigue, MS, ALS, Alzheimer's, epilepsy, Parkinson's and other neurological disorders; and

WHEREAS:

Ticks that carry Lyme Disease can also carry at least 19 other pathogens, many of them transmitted within minutes of being bitten, with one tick bite frequently resulting in multiple infections including bacteria, parasites, and viruses which can all be potentially fatal; and

WHEREAS:

Twenty-Five percent (25%) of all cases of Lyme Disease are from children and the CDC reports it can be passed down from Mother to fetus or congenitally; and

WHEREAS:

New science as well as treatment and testing guidelines have been released from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality National Guidelines Clearinghouse, and all doctors in Texas are encouraged to utilize these new guidelines to quickly diagnose and treat Lyme Disease; and

WHEREAS:

Texas Lyme Alliance provides advocacy for patients of congenital Lyme, pediatric Lyme, and a treatment for all.
